## Our Te Tiriti o Waitangi Commitment

As an autonomous Crown Entity, we acknowledge Te Tiriti o Waitangi as foundational to our identity as a country and the relationship with Māori at its heart. We recognise Māori right to tino rangatiratanga and will seek to integrate into our mahi, the following principles of Te Tiriti o Waitangi:

### Mana Taurite – Equity

*Equitable outcomes for Māori creatives and audiences*

**Connecting and reflecting Aotearoa**

### **Whakamarumarutia – Active Protection**

*Encouragement of te Reo Māori and Tikanga Māori both within the agency and in funded content*

### **Kōwhiringa – Options**

*The right of choice for Māori to engage with te ao Māori and te ao Pākehā*

### **Mahi Tahi – Partnership**

*Partnership with Māori stakeholders and Iwi to ensure mutually beneficial outcomes for all audiences.*

Our Rautaki Māori embodies these principles and will be reviewed annually to provide an ongoing demonstration of our commitment to honouring the intent of Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

## **He Awa Whiria – Our Commitment to Equity and Representation**

We celebrate the rich tapestry of cultures within our country through our model of He Awa Whiria, the braided river. We are committed to serving the many audiences outlined in the Broadcasting Act and those represented in the changing face of Aotearoa New Zealand. We embrace and celebrate an inclusive and multi-cultural society, as evidenced by our Equity and Representation strategy, fostering connection at every opportunity.

## Our approach

Our strategy is built upon our purpose, fundamental principles of public media, and Te Tiriti o Waitangi. These encompass enhancing the culture of Aotearoa New Zealand, expanding the variety and inclusivity of local content accessible to New Zealanders, guaranteeing that content is easily accessible, strengthening social cohesion, and promoting well-informed discussions.

The Broadcasting Act 1989 s.36(1) requires us

- (a) to reflect and develop New Zealand identity and culture by
  - (i) promoting programmes about New Zealand and New Zealand interests; and
  - (ii) promoting Māori language and Māori culture.

We are required to meet a range of performance measures agreed to with Government (see our Statement of Performance Expectations).

## Our Strategic Framework

Our Strategic Framework brings together our vision, purpose, commitments and goals, providing a clear and shared 'why' for our work. It articulates our role as a public media funder in a rapidly changing media environment, and the outcomes we seek for audiences, creators and the wider creative and cultural sectors.

The Strategic Framework is structured around five interconnected pillars - **Engage, Enable, Respond, Inform** and **Elevate**. Together, these pillars describe the way NZ On Air focuses its effort and investment to reflect and develop New Zealand identity and culture. These pillars support our cultural and economic objectives and align with the Government's *Amplify* strategy and its goals of investing for maximum impact, nurturing talent, and reducing barriers to growth across the creative and cultural sectors.

The Framework is deliberately outcomes-focused and enduring. It guides organisational priorities, decision-making, performance and culture, while allowing flexibility in how we respond to change. The principles, priorities and rules that translate this direction into day-to-day funding decisions sit within our [Investment Model](#), which functions as our operational strategy.

In essence, *Te Ipukarea* and the *Strategic Framework* define our direction, our ambition and our contribution - setting out who we are and how NZ On Air uses public funding to ensure New Zealanders are connected through our stories and songs, now and into the future.
